In 2011, the Old Girtonians' Association (OGA) kindly donated \$6,000 to the Music Department to enable the purchase of an Orchestra Marimba. The instrument purchased was a Yamaha four and a half octave Concert Marimba. The instrument has rosewood keys and apart from looking beautiful, has a stunning sound. An instrument of this quality will last many, many years and be used in a number of Ensembles in the Senior School. The marimba as an instrument completes the Senior Percussion Ensemble, directed by Mr. David Turpie. This Ensemble has six members and the students perform on all instruments used in the orchestral percussion section. One key element of "The Senior Percussion Ensemble" is the use of keyboard percussion instruments to add pitch, melody, harmony and tonal variation to the Ensembles sound. The keyboard instruments also give the opportunity for the Ensemble to explore melodic percussion repertoire and give extension Ensemble experiences for our Senior piano students.

One instrument can make a significant change to a program and the addition of the Concert Marimba has made that change. Two piano students have now become very involved in Symphony Orchestra, Senior Concert Band and Percussion Ensemble as a result of the purchase of this instrument. The tone of the Marimba adds beautifully to the percussion sections of Senior Concert Band and Symphony Orchestra, allowing a rich range of music to be performed. The Girton Music Department, staff and students, will continue to benefit from this generous purchase. Our thanks go to all in the OGA for their hard work and wonderful support.

If someone had asked me 2 years ago where I would be in the year 2012, or where I wanted my life to go in the years to come, I would have responded with complete assurance that I had absolutely no idea. If I could have seen myself and my life two years later, I would not have recognised the person I am today compared to the person I was then. I was perfectly happy letting the days pass by and leaving decisions about the future years until they eventually rolled around.

Today I am less than 3 weeks away from moving to the "big smoke" with Melbourne College life and University staring back at me, and I am literally counting down the days. If there was a way to fast forward this waiting process into something somewhat shorter and faster, I would give anything for it. However, I can't help but wonder how someone who was so unsure can find themselves so determined and certain only 24 months later? How can someone's life aspirations change so drastically and so rapidly?

I began 2010 with the attitude that VCE at Girton was only going to get better, that eventually the long hours of homework, SAC preparation and exam revision would gradually become easier and that I would inevitably grow to love my subjects. I would like to thank the generosity of wonderful staff who supported me and made my journey so worthwhile.

Executive Officers' Report

The Old Girtonians' Association has a strong history with the School since 1914 and now boasts over 1000 members worldwide. Our membership has grown significantly this year with over 90% of these new memberships from our valedictorians of 2011.

The Association provides fellowship and networking opportunities on a global scale. As custodians of the School's history we are committed to supporting the ongoing development of Girton, and ensuring that the OGA remains an integral part of the School.

In May, the OGA made a major acquisition and purchased an Orchestral Marimba for the School. This outstanding musical instrument is a wonderful addition to the Music Department, adding depth and breadth to the Orchestra and their performances. At a cost of \$6000, the OGA is very honoured to have provided the School with a superb instrument that will last for many decades and that many Girtonians will benefit from.

The Annual Reunion Dinner, held in May attracted the highest number of guests on record for many years. In 2011, the OGA

decided to introduce a Five Year Reunion. Over 40% of the 2006 cohort attended their Inaugural Dinner. During the evening, we acknowledged the outstanding work of four staff who have served the School for over 20 years, and who continue to teach, by presenting them with Honourary Associate Life Membership. They include: Mr Rick McWaters. Mrs Liz Tobias, Mrs Viv Bath (McNair) and Mrs Sandra Kroker. We congratulate Mr. Connor Rochford (12 Frew, 2010) and Ms Fiona Heathcote (12 Riley, 2010) as the dual recipients of the Departing Girtonian Scholarship for 2010. These scholarships supported Connor and Fiona in their first year at University in Melbourne, with Connor studying at Monash and Fiona at Melbourne. The popularity of the One Year Reunion held in December in Bendigo was well attended with numbers attending averaging nearly 60% of

In addition to these events, the Headmaster's XI Cricket was cancelled owing to inclement weather and will now be held over until October 2012.

Headmaster's Report To The OGA


As Alumni, it is important to know what has been happening at your School. The School is not mine or the staffs; our job is to steward it, to leave it better than we found it - to take the torch, hold it high and then pass it on, brighter than ever. I contend that modern Heads must have experimental minds and through experience, wise hearts. From heart to head is a mantra that I repeat with great regularity. It was the first key idea built upon in 2011. In many ways it typifies our culture and our approach to learning. It speaks of the importance of the "way" we are with each other. It is a clear acknowledgement that how we feel about something will dictate how we learn. It helps us understand that emotions are contagious and we must work hard to teach empathy to our young people, for, they will leave us and go into a world where the winds of moral relativism blow. In many ways the choice between right and wrong is easy, but the shades of grey and ambiguity between right and wrong are what our graduates must be able to face. In 2011 I spoke on the theme of happiness. More specifically, when taken in the context of what we want for our children, "happiness" and "choices" are the words used when parents articulate their aspirations for their children to me. What is it then, this thing called happiness and can it be taught? The second

part of the question is yes, because whilst happiness is in part genetic and situational, a significant part can be taught. To answer the first part of the question, I offer simply this: happiness is about relationships, connections, purpose, meaning and choices. It is about respecting the preciousness, equality and fragility of every human life. Given that much human behaviour at the neurobiological and hormonal level is automatic, we have to teach Girtonians to make default responses which are rooted in human decency not expedience. Our burgeoning work on teaching emotional literacy is very promising. Our three staff who went to Yale are continuing to improve and innovate in this area. I trust you will see how this key idea of "heart to head," is enacted. Be it in curriculum design and delivery, knowledge management - (new website or our new Synergetic database), review of our Co-Curriculum, introduction of

our Early Commencement Programme, our servicelearning continuum, DGR scholarship and new buildings - all are tiles which in concert make up the mosaic that is Girton Grammar

School Bendigo. Relationships and relationship centred learning are at the core of our Mission and Values.

My contention is that we have continued to build on the fine very work of those who have gone before, but there is much, much

Financial Report

Finances in 2011 for the OGA were pleasing. Our income was just over \$28,000 with a closing bank balance at the end of 2011 of \$16,596.79. The closing balance was lower in 2011 owing to the Association making a substantial donation to the School in the form of an Orchestral Marimba valued at \$6000 and because in 2011 there were two Year 12 students awarded with a "Departing Girtonian Scholarship" valued at \$2000 each, as opposed to one recipient in previous years. Additional income was generated by investing funds that were not required for day to day operational expenses in Term Deposits which for 2011 totaled \$644.11.

Retaining surplus funds not only ensured the ongoing financial viability of the OGA but also ensured that we continued to support Girton via donations, such as:

- Sponsorship of Annual Speech Night Dux Prizes of \$1,000.00
- Continuing to provide a gift of a personalised Farewell Coffee Mug to each Departing Year 12 student
- Supporting the "One Year Reunion"
- Supporting the Headmaster's X1 Cricket Match - which owing to inclement weather, was postponed with costs associated with the event being carried across to support the 2012 Match scheduled for early

It is planned that in 2012 the Association will be investing in updated signage and banners in order to promote the OGA at various events throughout the year and to help secure our branding within the School community.

98 students or 88.3% of 2011 Year 12s took up Life Membership - compared to 94 (85.5%) in 2010. A number of past students not from the 2011 Year 12 cohort also joined the Association which is promising.

Overall Life Membership currently stands at 1175. To break the 1000 membership mark is a great achievement. With the introduction of an excellent data management system by the School in May 2011, the Association will benefit greatly as we now have the capacity to capture far more data to help us reconnect and build on the relationships we share with our past students and staff.

Thank you to the School's Business Office staff who help us process Life Membership payments and for continuing to support the Association by accepting payment for events by credit card. This makes it much easier for people to make plans to attend events.

In closing, I thank Rebecca Paton for her dedication and commitment to the Association in her official capacity as Treasurer for the past five years. Rebecca formally stood down as Treasurer on 31st December 2011 and the Association has been guided in all matters financial, both professionally and competently during her time as Treasurer. I also thank the Headmaster, the School and the Business Office for their continued support of our financial processes

Melbourne OGA Report

A delightful afternoon was enjoyed by many Old Girtonians', Saturday 15th October at St Dunstans's Church, Camberwell to celebrate the Melbourne Branch 80th Anniversary.

The inaugural meeting was held Wednesday, 29th July 1931 at 3.15pm with 23 people present, marking the beginning of the Melbourne Branch of an Association that now continues to meet at least twice per year, eighty years later.

Over 50 people attended, representing all decades. The 80th celebration was opened with a prayer from Reverend Elizabeth Alfred.

Introduced by Mitch Trevena-Vernon, Year 11 students, James Mawby (Year 11 Jenkin), Jesse Jackson (Year 11 Frew) and Anusha Jayasekera (Year 11 Jenkin) shared their experiences of their current schooling at Girton.

Mr Matthew Maruff, Headmaster, congratulated the group on its longevity and gave a short address.

Past students, Henry Ngo (2008 Year 12 Frew) and Fenella Wagener (2008 Year 12 Jenkin) proposed a toast, then everyone joined in a rousing rendition of the school song, followed by Grace from Bess Daly and a sumptuous afternoon tea.

For some it was the first time to re-connect with Girtonians since their last days as a student. There are many old Girtonians who have contributed to the longevity of the Melbourne Branch. Eighty years of continuous functions and meetings of old Girtonians is a long time in any history book. It is not only to those who initiated the beginning of this branch but the many who have ensured the original reason for meeting has been continued. Past Presidents, Secretaries, Treasurers and Committee members attended the celebration. This was an opportunity to thank those who have given the purpose and continuity, which have resulted in the Melbourne branch of the Old Girtonians celebrating 80 years.

Thank you to all who attended the afternoon and we were sorry many were not able to be with us but who sent their wishes.

The Basket Luncheon is one of the annual functions, hosted by Janice Maddern. For those who attended, Girton's Headmaster, Matthew Maruff, spoke of his first year at the School, the achievements of the students and the school community.

Our second annual function for the year was the Annual General Meeting and afternoon tea. This function was, as usual, hosted by Judy Appleton, daughter of Lady Townsend (Jean Smythe 1932). It was held in the same venue as the 70th celebration, at St Dunstan's Church, Camberwell, to accommodate the larger number of Old Girtonians in attendance.

The Melbourne Branch continues to support the Girton academic program with Speech Night Awards. These are the June Todd Prize for Excellence in English/Literature and the Old Girtonians' Association –Melbourne Branch Award for the Performing Arts, in memory of Margot Nolan.

We are grateful for the ongoing support by Girton Grammar School and the Bendigo Branch of the Old Girtonians. We thank Mitch Trevena-Vernon, Community Relations Manager and Executive Officer of the OGA, for her continued support of the Melbourne Branch and keeping our members up-to-date with Girton's news and invitations to many functions. - confidence and a sense of achievement





Girton Friendships Span the Globe

In 2009 I completed my VCE and in the following year began a 3 year Bachelor of Accounting course at La Trobe University's Bendigo Campus.

After just one year of study, in December 2010, I received a letter that gave me the opportunity to apply for the International Network of Universities Targeted Travelling Scholarship. This scholarship effectively paid for a semester of study abroad. The initial application process included an essay based around why you think you should be awarded the scholarship, along with academic and personal references.

Success in the early stages meant that I was onto the next hurdle which was an interview at the Bundoora campus of La Trobe. That must have gone well because a week later I received acceptance into the Program for Second Semester 2011.

On arrival in London, I spent a week with my sister (who lives in London) and the second week was spent on the London Orientation Tour organised by the University of Leicester for International Students. We toured the major sights of London and took a tour through Oxford University and Stratford Upon Avon (the home of Shakespeare). The first week at Leicester was the International Students Welcome programme which gave an overall introduction to the University. There were also activities aimed at encouraging people to get to know each other. It was at one of those activities that I met my (about to become) best exchange friend who is from Florida, USA. The next couple of weeks were spent settling into our accommodation, getting to know the house mates, registering and getting used to Leicester life. My accommodation had breakfast and



dinner included (a great bonus) and there was a bus directly to the University. So, no troubles getting to and from class and no need to worry about cooking.

After I was settled in I spent every second or third weekend away from Leicester; even taking a week off to spend with my cousin (who had just finished VCE at Girton). I managed a trip to Wales and another to Scotland. The train system in the UK makes it easy to travel to pretty much anywhere you want. I could have travelled more than I did but I so enjoyed the people that I was living with, that I didn't feel the need.

I did feel under pressure as my time at Leicester came to an end and assessment tasks had to be completed. After my essays were completed I was lucky enough to have a couple of days when it snowed. I spent Christmas and New Year with my sister and a couple of weekends away with people I had met at Leicester.

In the first week of the new year two of my friends arrived, one of them being Meghan, also from Girton, and we were off on a 12 day whirlwind Contiki tour of Europe, starting from London, going up through Amsterdam, down to Munich, via Austria, spending four days in Italy (I loved Venice) and then through Switzerland to Paris for two days. We had incredible fun and saw and experienced so many amazing things none of us will forget.

Now I'm home to complete my last year of university. I have the travel bug and hopefully will be going on another trip overseas at the end of the year, before moving onto life after university!
